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## Beware of the Lame Duck Congress

Republicans may be in control of the U.S. House of Representatives when the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress comes to Washington, D.C. in January, but the 111<sup>th</sup> Congress isn't dead yet. When the disastrous Pelosi-Reid-led Congress comes back for its lame duck session on November 15<sup>th</sup>, it should have one thing in mind: do no more harm to country or party. But clearly, doing what the American people want has not been the modus operandi thus far. We should all be uneasy, because two months is enough time to do a lot more damage if we let our guards down.

Let's review. When the 111<sup>th</sup> Congress began its war against prosperity in January 2009, the national debt registered at \$10.6 trillion; it is currently \$13.7 trillion and rising rapidly. The unemployment rate stood at 7.7 percent. Today, 22 months later, because Obama, Pelosi, and Reid focused on everything *except* jobs and the economy, our unemployment rate has been stuck at 9.6 percent for three months and has been over 9 percent for 18 straight months. This is the first time this has happened since 1982-1983, when unemployment stayed above 9 percent for 19 straight months before the Reagan economic package took effect and ushered in unprecedented economic growth for the rest of the decade. If this lame duck Congress does one thing and one thing only - it is imperative that it extends every single one of President Bush's tax relief items. Before the

historic 2010 elections, Obama, Pelosi, and Reid's tax strategy seemed to be centered on picking and choosing who deserves tax cuts and who doesn't. Continuing this anti-growth mentality in the lame duck Congress would be a colossal mistake and would cause gridlock in the U.S. Senate. It doesn't take a genius to know that in this type of economic situation every American urgently needs tax relief, not just the folks Obama, Pelosi, and Reid judge to be worthy of help.

It's not a stretch to say that a majority of Americans would be satisfied with the 111<sup>th</sup> Congress coming back, extending the tax cuts and leaving for home, never to be seen again, except in the history books in the "how NOT to govern" section. However, if Obama, Pelosi, and Reid go in the wrong direction once again - that is to force unpopular legislation on the American people while they still have the numbers - they would only be inviting further destruction of their party as well as setting back our economic recovery. Whether it be attempting to pass an amnesty immigration bill that would reward illegal activity; or trying to ram cap and trade (also known as cap and tax) through the Senate somehow; or convincing some fragile Senate Republicans to approve President Obama's naïve New START treaty; or for a third time, trying to limit First Amendment rights with the DISCLOSE Act, Democrats would

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be wise to look at their 2012 election map a bit early before doing something astonishingly dense.

Consider these stubborn facts. In the U.S. Senate for starters, 21 Democrats and 2 Independents who caucus with Democrats will face the voters in 2012. Across the aisle, only 10 Republicans in the Senate are up for re-election. At least 11 of these Senate Democrats (Sherrod Brown (OH); Maria Cantwell (WA); Bob Casey (PA); Amy Klobuchar (MN); Joe Manchin (WV); Claire McCaskill (MO); Ben Nelson (NE); Bill Nelson (FL); Debbie Stabenow (MI); Jon Tester (MT); and Jim Webb (VA)) is likely to face tough challenges. Conversely, only 2 out of 10 Republicans are expected to face any serious challenge (Scott Brown (MA) and John Ensign (NV)).

There is no doubt that anyone who joins the effort to move on these unpopular items on the Democrat wish list would be remembered by the voters in two years and appropriately punished. Meanwhile, across the U.S. Capitol Building in the lower chamber, although more than 60 House Democrats just lost their seats, at least two dozen more members had their political lives flash before their eyes in very close races. These Democrats know who they are and would be wise to stop Nancy Pelosi's lame duck charge before it starts.

In closing, the best course of action for the lame duck Democrats is to simply work with Republicans to extend all the Bush tax cuts, and then go home and get started on a different agenda that doesn't make American's think of Lyndon Johnson and Jimmy Carter's worst days.


### Make the Bush Tax Cuts Permanent

The current Congress has shown an unwill-

ingness to make the Bush era tax cuts permanent. Because the Democrat majority has focused on class warfare rather than leadership, our nation is on the verge of one of the largest tax increases in its history. The Bush tax cuts doubled the child tax credit, lowered capital gains tax rates, eliminated the marriage penalty, and lowered all tax brackets. In these troubled economic times, allowing these tax cuts to expire will have disastrous consequences. Renew the Bush tax cuts permanently for all.

### Repeal Obamacare

On March 21, 2010 the House of Representatives passed the unconstitutional Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, better known as Obamacare. As we saw in the last Congress, neither members nor their staff had sufficient time to read voluminous legislation before being forced to cast their votes. During the healthcare debate, Republican Leader John Boehner cautioned:

*“And look at how this bill was written. Can you say it was done openly, with transparency and accountability? Without back-room deals, and struck behind closed doors, hidden from the people? Hell no, you can’t!”*

*Have you read the bill? Have you read the reconciliation bill? Have you read the manager’s amendment? Hell no, you haven’t!”*

Learn from this legislative debacle. Support efforts to place every bill online for at least 3 days before voting on it.

Another important legislative guideline – say no to earmarks! The American people are tired of legislation being crafted in backroom deals based on personal interests. There should be no more “Cornhusker Compromises,” “Louisiana Purchases,” or “Bridges to Nowhere.” If the Congress is to enact legislation, it should be for the good of all Americans, not the special interests of the few.

We’ve already seen members of the political establishment express a need to “co-opt” the incoming freshman members who are proud Tea Party conservatives. I’ve seen far too many Members of Congress come to town and forget the principles and values that their constituents embraced when sending them to Washington.

Stay true to your values, stay true to your principles, and as Jefferson Smith exhorted in *Mr. Smith Goes to Washington*:

*“Just get up off the ground, that’s all I ask. Get up there with that lady that’s up on top of this Capitol dome, that lady that stands for liberty. Take a look at this country through her eyes if you really want to see something. And you won’t just see scenery; you’ll see the whole parade of what Man’s carved out for himself, after centuries of fighting. Fighting for something better than just jungle law, fighting so he can stand on his own two feet, free and decent, like he was created, no matter what his race, color, or creed. That’s what you’d see. There’s no place out there for graft, or greed, or lies, or compromise with human liberties ...*

*Great principles don’t get lost once they come to light. They’re right here; you just have to see them again!”*

## Don't Forget the State Legislative Victories

On November 2<sup>nd</sup>, conservatives were ecstatic that control of the House of Representatives was taken away from liberal Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA). That election brought in over 60 new Republicans (with some close races still to be decided as of this writing). Conservatives are hopeful these new Republicans will drive a stake through the heart of the Obama Administration's leftwing agenda. Conservatives also saw gains in the Senate, with Rand Paul (R-KY) and Marco Rubio (R-FL) being among some of the more conservative members elected that night.

And while conservative gains fell short of full control in the Senate, Republicans picked up 11 governorships from the Democrats, with many of the newly elected GOP governors being conservative. A majority of governors in 2010 were Democratic, now it's a Republican majority.

Below these big ticket races, conservatives should also consider the historic gains made in the state legislatures. Republicans gained a whopping 680 seats in state legislatures (with a few more races yet to be decided as of this writ-

ing). According to *The Hotline*, "The GOP gained majorities in at least 14 state house chambers. They now have unified control -- meaning both chambers -- of 26 state legislatures." Before the Tuesday elections, Republicans had unified control of only 15 chambers.

This is far more than the Republicans gained in their 1994 wave (with 472 seats), and even more than the 1974 Democratic Watergate-era wave (628 seats). Control of four state legislative chambers, as of this writing, is being decided due to the closeness of the elections: New York, Oregon, Colorado, and Washington.

If you include states where Republicans picked up just one of the two state legislative chambers, you have to go back to 1928 to find a time when Republicans controlled this many state legislatures. This should be good news for conservatives, as sound state policies now have a chance of being enacted after liberal Democratic control. States that enact conservative fiscal policies and other conservative policy measures may soon take the lead in getting out of the economic doldrums Obamanomics has created.

From 1956 to 2002, Democrats controlled a majority of the nation's legislative seats. Their lock began to break during the George W. Bush years, but swung back in 2006. After seeing what the Democrats' lurch to the left has brought, majorities across the country voted to put a stop to it in 2010.

In the South, historic bastions of Democratic state legislative power suddenly shifted into Republican hands. North Carolina's legislature flipped for the first time since 1870. Alabama saw both chambers become Republicans, which had not occurred since Reconstruction.

In the Rust Belt and Midwest, the GOP gained control of the state legislatures in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Indiana.

In Iowa, Republicans picked up control of the state senate, along with bringing back Republican governor Terry Branstad. And in another shocker, all three of the Iowa Supreme Court justices lost their retention elections. These were the three justices that voted to overturn Iowa's law protecting traditional marriage. State judges across the country (where they are accountable to the voters) are on notice now that there is a limit to out of touch liberal judicial activism.

The Midwestern state of Minnesota, which gave us liberal Democrats like Eugene McCarthy, Hubert Humphrey, and Walter Mondale, couldn't resist the Republican tide. Republicans picked up both state chambers in the "Land of 10,000 Lakes" for the first time.

Even New England, long a bastion of liberal Democratic stalwarts, moved Republican. Maine elected a Republican governor, state senate, and state house.

New Hampshire, long a Republican outpost in a sea of Democratic neighbors, was recently seen to be succumbing to the Democrats. Not after the 2010 elections. The Granite State

saw Republicans win back both state legislative chambers, including a jaw dropping 100 seat gain in the state's 400 member state house.

These changes at the state level not only mean that conservative policy ideas now have a chance of being enacted, but it could also help keep Republican gains in the House of Representatives for possibly the next decade. For one thing, state legislators are a sort of "farm team" for the party in power, helping them field good candidates for Congress when one retires. For another, a majority of these legislatures will be involved in the redistricting battles that lay ahead after the recent 2010 Census.

Not all states legislatures draw up district lines. In California, during this past election, voters passed Proposition 20, which allows for an independent commission to draw up the state and Congressional district boundaries. However, it remains to be seen just how non-partisan the California independent commission will be.

Helping Republicans gain power at this level was Ed Gillespie, the chairman of the Republican State Leadership Committee (RSLC). His organization spent more than \$30 million to help Republicans win control of state legislatures. He stated in his post-election memo: "The bottom line is that Republicans will have a much greater impact on the redistricting process as a result of yesterday's elections."


Where state legislatures draw up the districts, Republicans are now firmly in the driver's seat. Conservatives should work to make sure that Republicans stay on the conservative path, but not overlook their recent victories over many formidable liberal bastions at the state level. The Democratic losses, after the 2006 and 2008 gains, could not have come at a worse time for them and their liberal agenda.

## Conservative Women Led the GOP Comeback

Conservative Republicans nationwide made a resounding comeback Tuesday night, recapturing the majority in the U.S. House by picking up more than 60 seats - the biggest gains since 1948! In addition to the historic night in the House, Republicans added 6 seats in the U.S. Senate, 18 State House chambers switched, and there will be 11 new Republican governors starting in 2011.

President Obama, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, and soon-to-be-ex Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi saw a repudiation of their irresponsible and out of touch left-wing agenda, and the comeback of a vibrant and hopeful conservative movement - with women leading the way.

A large number of Republican women ran for Congress this year – 51 to be exact – and those winning their races included Sandy Adams of Florida, Diane Black of Tennessee, Vicky Hartzler of Missouri, Jaime Herrera of Washington, Kristi Noem of South Dakota, and Martha Roby of Alabama, all of whom took over seats previously held by Democrats. They will join *Fire From the Heartland* cast members and incumbent Congresswomen Michele Bachmann, Cynthia Lummis, and Jean Schmidt in the House this January.

Some of the other notable GOP women who prevailed include rising stars Nikki Haley and Susana Martinez, the first female governors of South Carolina and New Mexico, respectively, and Kelly Ayotte, who trounced liberal Rep. Paul Hodes to

become the junior U.S. Senator from New Hampshire.

This fall has been a very busy season at Citizens United. We premiered three documentaries; *America at Risk*, *Fire from the Heartland*, and *Battle for America*. All were well received, and *Battle for America* was named "Film of the Year" by Fox Nation. All three films pushed the debate in their issue areas and I am proud of the final products.

Our first of three documentaries, *America at Risk*, hosted by Newt and Callista Gingrich, was premiered on the ninth anniversary of the September 11th attacks to a crowd of over 350 people in Washington, D.C. The film investigates the roots of radical Islam's hatred toward the West. As we pass the one year anniversary of the Fort Hood terrorist attack, the Obama Administration refuses, to this day, to acknowledge that the Fort Hood shooting was a result of radical Islam. *America at Risk* is a must see documentary that will help shape the War on Terror debate in the years ahead.

The second documentary released was *Fire from the Heartland*. This film brings America back to its core principles based upon a limited federal government. *Battle for America* is the third movie in the "Tea Party Trilogy" which includes *Fire from the Heartland* and *Generation Zero*.
